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During this practicum opportunity, I participated in an 8th grade Composition and Literature class at Powell Middle School. I engaged in hands-on teaching activities under the mentorship of an experienced Language Arts teacher. I prepared lessons to teach students about grammar and parts of speech. The first lesson was on adverbs and the second lesson focused on dependent and independent clauses. This experience allowed me to apply my knowledge in the classroom, through Kahoot reviews, creating content slides and exit tickets.
